The Therapy Program at CTF ILLINOIS focuses on meeting individual sensory, communication and self-care needs in a functional way. Each person has purpose. CTF ILLINOIS' Day Training sites provide care to over 174 adults with severe and profound disabilities statewide. The goal is to assist people in achieving their purpose and reaching their greatest potential.

Structured teaching is a known strategy that is implemented to create order within a given task. Each task is organized in

a manner that supports a clear beginning, middle and end to the task. People are given individualized instruction in order to master the task at hand. These skills are then applied to self care (article continued on page 6)

n 1987, President Ronald Reagan signed a proclamation declaring March as National Developmental Disabilities (DD) Awareness month. The proclamation was a result of years of advocating on behalf of individuals with developmental disabilities and their families. CTF ILLINOIS works year round to promote and protect the rights of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and to empower them to live and work as important and productive members of society.

In February and March, individuals from the CTF ILLINOIS Advocacy Center participated in a national campaign entitled "**Spread the Word**, **To End the Word."** The campaign started 7 years ago to build awareness for society to stop and think about its use of the R-word. In February, several individuals recorded public service announcements (PSAs) at a local radio station to help spread the word. vocational tasks that will assist the person in becoming as independent as possible.

Reagan Carey, Director of The Autism Program at CTF ILLINOIS, believes in a supportive teaching style for individuals with severe/profound needs. The style includes how you approach an individual, how you prepare them for their day and from activity to activity and to create opportunities for teaching individuals how to communicate and make choices.

"There are a number of services and structures that CTF ILLINOIS provides to a wide range of people with disabilities" states Eric Edquist, Vice President South Suburban Operations for CTF ILLINOIS in Homewood, IL. "Our day program provides schedules aimed at people with severe disabilities. Schedules developed include sensory integration, exercise, relaxation and yoga to increase their independence. We also have a sensory room that provides total body sensory integration."

Edquist also says that partnering with other companies and organizations to provide services is key to each individual's goal. Companies such as ABA of Illinois to provide behavior therapy and write programs specifically designed for an individual's needs; Auxilium Healthcare Services to provide Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy and Speech services; and South Suburban Special Recreational Association for swim classes, art therapy, pet therapy, dance classes and sporting events.

All of these combined with additional community activities such as vacations, overnight trips, zoos, museums and beaches provide opportunities for most individuals to have fun and to reach their greatest potential.
